



The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) is a federal nutrition program that provides low income nutritionally at-risk pregnant women, postpartum mothers, infants, and children up to 5 years old with

- nutritious foods/groceries
- nutrition education
- breastfeeding support
- referrals to health care, social services and community resources





- Available in all 50 States, 33 Indian Tribal Organizations, American Soma, District of Columbia, Guam, Commonwealth of the Northern Marina Islands, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.
- Clinic locations can include county health departments, hospitals, schools, mobile clinics, community centers, public housing, health centers, and Indian Health Service clinics.

# Eligibility

- At or below 185% of the federal poverty line or income-eligible based on participation in other programs such as Medicaid, SNAP, and TANF
- Nutritionally 'at-risk' as determined through a nutrition assessment conducted by WIC







Comparing the number of WIC-eligible Medicaid participants to the number of WIC participants by county in November 2021.









### Food Package Benefit Redemption

The amount of money provided to local grocery stores and farmers markets when WIC participants redeem their WIC food package benefits is called benefit redemption costs. During the first two years of the COVID-19 pandemic (March 2020 through February 2022), WIC food package benefit redemptions infused \$7 billion into local economies.

Great news! The WIC Cash Value Benefit (CVB) for <u>fresh and frozen</u> fruits and vegetables is being adjusted due to inflation and will be increasing to the following amounts:

- Children (over the age of one): \$25/month per child.
- Pregnant and Postpartum Participants: \$44/month.
- Breastfeeding Participants: \$49/month.
- Exclusively Breastfeeding Multiples: \$73.50/month.

Today, wichealth has more than 50 lessons in English and Spanish, 1,200 resources designed to guide parents and a recipe der to help families search for recipes pproved foods.








#### REFERRALS TO CARE BEYOND WIC

- Low-cost immunization referrals.
- Referrals for low-cost medical and dental care, health insurance, child care, housing, breastfeeding support and other services that can benefit the whole family.
- Substance abuse counseling.
- Domestic abuse counseling.
- Social services.



Referrals or connections to other services such as prenatal or pediatric care, dental care, and social services are part of the core services provided through WIC. Through referrals, WIC builds bridges, connecting families to primary and preventive health care and social service resources.
